The **Louisiana Insurance Fraud Task Force** is a statutorily mandated partnership between three state agencies created to collectively investigate and deter acts of insurance fraud and auto theft in Louisiana.

The three state agencies comprising the Task Force are:

Louisiana State Police

Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit

Office of the Attorney General

Insurance Fraud Support Unit

Louisiana Department of Insurance

Office of Insurance Fraud

Insurance fraud is any fraudulent act, knowingly and willfully committed by any person in an attempt to injure, defraud, or deceive an insurance company. In Louisiana, insurance fraud is a felony, and when convicted, penalties could include incarceration, fines, community service, probation and/or restitution.

NOTE: If the amount of the benefit that is the subject of the criminal act does not exceed \$1,000.00, the insurance fraud will be classified as a misdemeanor.

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
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Letter From The Superintendent



Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit

The Unit

In 1999 the Louisiana Legislature passed House Bill 1868, statutorily creating the Insurance Fraud Investigation Unit (IFU) within Title 40 of the Revised Statutes; specifically, Sections 40:1421–1429 provide the outline for unit operations. The IFU became operational January 1, 2000, within the Bureau of Investigation (BOI) of the Louisiana State Police (LSP), thereby implementing a law enforcement function to combat insurance fraud. In 2006, the State Police formally added auto theft responsibilities to the unit's role. At that time it was renamed the Insurance Fraud and Auto Theft Unit (IFAT). The primary focus of the unit is the investigation of insurance acts that violate LRS 22:1921-1929.



Currently, IFAT is divided into six field offices and three satellite offices, which covers the 64 parishes of the state. Detectives and Investigators within each office are tasked with investigating criminal complaints from the LA Dept. of Insurance and from the public. Each field office is supervised by an IFAT Sergeant, who answers directly to the LSP-IFAT Program Coordinator. The Program Coordinator holds the rank of State Police Lieutenant and is under the supervision of a State Police Captain who commands the LSP Special Investigation Section. The Program Coordinator is tasked with working alongside State Police supervisors, staff, industry representatives, and governmental partners to ensure the success of the unit's mission. Excluding the IFAT supervisors, there were eight State Police Troopers and seven State Police Criminal Investigators assigned to the Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit as of December '2024.

Referrals Received...

The Insurance Fraud and Auto Theft Unit receives insurance fraud referrals from the Louisiana Department of Insurance (LDI) on a monthly basis. In 2024, the Unit received 2,884 referrals from the LDI, of which 257 were accepted and 2,627 were declined.

In addition to the 2,884 referrals received from the LDI, the IFAT Unit also accepted 87 non-LDI criminal complaints related to insurance fraud, vehicle theft, and other crimes. These complaints were received from various entities, including IFAT Unit generated operations, other law enforcement agencies, citizens complaints, etc.



In 2024, 73% of the referrals received from the Department of Insurance were related to auto claims fraud, followed by property & casualty fraud at 15.9%, healthcare fraud at 4.7%, and life insurance fraud at 2.1%. The remaining types listed in the table to the right make up the remaining 4.3%.



In 2024, the LSP IFAT Unit opened 205 criminal investigations and closed 210 investigations.

OPENED: The Baton Rouge & New Orleans field offices accounted for 112 opened investigations, Region 2 - Breaux Bridge (which includes Houma) and Sulphur field offices recorded 47 investigations opened, and Region 3 - Alexandria, Monroe, and Bossier initiated 51 investigations.


CLOSED: Of the 210 investigations closed, 120 or 57.1% were closed by arrest. In 2024, the IFAT Unit arrested a total of 137 individuals. Statewide, 51.1% of the arrests were in Region 1, 21.9% were in Region 2, and 27% were in Region 3.

In 2024, the LSP Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit had 38.5% of their convictions declared in East Baton Rouge Parish and 9.2% in Orleans Parish. Region 1 Investigative Highlights

Automobile Insurance Fraud

(East Baton Rouge) - In May of 2023, the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit received a criminal complaint from Farmers Insurance Company, alleging Cheryl Coleman engaged in fraudulent activities in an automobile insurance claim. A State Police investigation determined Coleman intentionally provided materially false information in her claim for damages, concealing that the vehicle was involved in a prior hit-and-run crash. Coleman claimed she was involved in a single-vehicle crash, which was found to be false. In reality, Coleman's son, whose license was suspended, was operating the vehicle in the at-fault, multivehicle hit-and-run crash. In a Louisiana State Police interview, Coleman admitted the claim was fraudulent. Coleman's actions caused Farmers Insurance to pay \$39,715.49, which would not have been covered damages. On July 15, 2024, Coleman was arrested and booked into the East Baton Rouge Parish Prison for violation of Louisiana Revised Statute 22:1925 - Automobile Insurance Fraud.

Computer Fraud / Forgery / Theft

(St. Tammany) - In June 2022, the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit-New Orleans Field Office (LSP-IFAT-NFO) received a criminal referral from the Louisiana Department of Insurance. According to the referral, Hart-Wig Moss Insurance Agency (HMIA) alleged Christie B. Salaun and Stacie Nurdin committed Producer Insurance Fraud in St. Tammany Parish. In March 2022, HMIA began investigating two employees with questionable account credits. HMIA's accounting department noticed that Salaun and Nurdin's clients had pending credits, which were brushed off as

endorsements when questioned. HMIA's internal investigation uncovered Salaun and Nurdin's illegal scheme and determined they defrauded customers. The invoices were altered, and the financial premiums were increased depending on the policy value (\$1,000.00 to \$1,500.00). HMIA uncovered that both Salaun and Nurdin worked in concert and increased random HMIA client premiums by \$256,000.00 over several years, eventually siphoning a portion of the overages for personal gain. On June 21, 2022, LSP-IFAT-NOFO initiated a criminal investigation and secured several search warrants for Salaun and Nurdin's electronic devices and computers. As a result of multiple search warrants and interviews that spanned two years, detectives determined HMIA allegations were factual and secured arrest warrants for both Salaun and Nurdin for the following LRS violations: 14: 67B(1) Theft of \$25,000 (\$256,000.00), 14:73.5 Computer Fraud, 14:72 Forgery, and 22:1924 Prohibited Actions and Sanctions (Insurance Fraud). On Tuesday, November 26, 2024, Salaun was booked into the St. Tammany Parish Jail. On Monday. December 2, 2024, Nurdin surrendered to Detectives at the St. Tammany Parish Jail, where she was charged accordingly.

Property and Casualty Fraud

(St. Tammany) - On March 1, 2024, the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit-New Orleans Field Office (LSP-IFAT-NFO) received a criminal referral from the Louisiana Department of Insurance (LDI) related to a suspicious insurance claim. This referral alleged that Sheronda Green committed Property and Casualty Insurance Fraud on January 12, 2024. The LSP investigation revealed that Sheronda Green's apartment complex sustained damage due to a grease fire that was started on her

stove. The fire occurred on January 12, 2024, at approximately 11:30 AM. Several hours after the fire had occurred, Green purchased a rental insurance policy for her personal belongings inside the apartment. Two days later, Green filed an insurance claim with Progressive, stating the fire had occurred on January 13, 2024. Based on the above-noted facts of the claim, Green misrepresented the date of loss and attempted to claim the date of loss two days after she had added rental insurance to cover her approximate \$30,000 loss. An arrest warrant was signed for Green on May 21, 2024, in the 22nd JDC for (1 count) 22:1924. Prohibited activities sanctions. On August 27, 2024, Green was arrested and booked on the aforementioned warrant in St. Tammany Parish Jail.

Region 2 Investigative Highlights Life Insurance Fraud

(St. Mary) - On December 6, 2023, the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit received a criminal complaint from the Louisiana Department of Insurance. According to the complaint, Candace M. Leblanc was suspected of forging a Death Beneficiary Change Request application fraudulently without the original beneficiary's knowledge permission. and Genworth Life and Annuity Insurance Company represented Policy 8102366 with proceeds payable on the life of Jerry M. Robichaux, Jr. for \$200,000.00. On August 11, 2002, Robichaux completed an application for a life insurance policy with First Colony Life Insurance (Currently Genworth Life Insurance). The application specified Robichaux as the proposed insured and owner while naming fiancé Sharon Bonner Vining as the primary beneficiary. On September 11, 2002, First Colony Life Insurance issued a 20year Term Life Policy 8102366 for \$200,000.00. According to the State of Louisiana Certification of Death No. 2022-043-G0630, Robichaux passed away from lung cancer at his residence in Morgan City on November 10, 2022. On November 11, Genworth Life Insurance received a Beneficiary Change Request application to indicate Candace M. Leblanc (listed as Spouse). The Beneficiary Change Request application came from the email address: ccane2001@yahoo.com, using mobile IP Address: 108.67.232.203. At 1:39 A.M., the Genworth Beneficiary Change Request application was emailed to \$customerserviceltc@genworth.com and was electronically signed "Jerry Robichaux" using DocuSign. On November 21, 2022, Sharon Vining Hebert initiated Claim 152345 against Policy 8102366 requesting Genworth Life Insurance benefits for \$200,000.00. Based on LSP's investigation, on November 11, 2022, at 1:39 A.M. Leblanc's actions showed intent to defraud Genworth Life Insurance and Beneficiary Sharon Vining Hebert by forging Robichaux's signature on a Beneficiary Change Request application. The forgery was committed after the death of Robichaux in an attempt to deprive Genworth Life Insurance and Beneficiary Sharon Vining Hebert in the amount of \$200,000.00. On July 15, 2024, Leblanc voluntarily surrendered and was arrested on the LSP warrant. Leblanc was booked into the St. Mary Parish Correction Center without incident. Leblanc's activities violated Louisiana Revised Statute Title 14:72 Forgery, (1 Count).

Investigative Highlights

Automobile Insurance Fraud

(Calcasieu) - In November 2022, the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit received a criminal referral from Progressive Insurance Company concerning allegations of insurance fraud being committed by Rogneisha E. Elliot. According to the referral, Elliott submitted a fraudulent automobile damage claim as a result of a hit-and-run accident. According Progressive, Elliott's policy had a lapse in coverage between August 10, 2022, and August 25, 2022. In support of her claim, Elliott falsified the date of the accident to secure coverage to which she was not entitled. The potential fraud amount was approximately \$6,230.00. A State Police investigation determined Elliott utilized the Progressive Insurance Company's Mobile App to file the claim and reported the accident occurred on August 30, 2022. It was determined the accident occurred on August 20, 2022, which was within the lapse period. During an interview with the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit, Elliott admitted to falsifying the date of the accident to have her vehicle repaired. An arrest warrant was obtained charging Elliott with 22:1925 Automobile Insurance Policies Fraud. On February 27, 2024, Elliott voluntarily surrendered herself to the Calcasieu Parish Correctional Center and was booked for violation of L.R.S. 22:1925 Automobile Insurance Policies Fraud (Felony).

Insurance Fraud / Fraudulent Medical Bills / Forgery

(Lafayette) - On September 1, 2023, the Louisiana Department of Insurance forwarded a criminal referral LDI 904741 to the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit.

According to the referral, Safeway Insurance Company of Louisiana alleged that Joshua Jones committed Automobile Insurance Fraud Lafayette Parish, Louisiana. On December 22, 2022, Brittney Crosley struck a parked vehicle in the parking lot of McDonald's at 3701 Louisiana Avenue, Lafayette, Louisiana. According to Crosley, the vehicle was unoccupied. Joshua Jones walked up to the scene and advised Crosley she had struck his car. The vehicle, in actuality, belonged to Jones' sister; Kristen Sanders. Sanders was not present at the scene of the accident. The Lafayette Police Department was summoned to the scene. Although, since the incident occurred in a parking lot, no report was made. Subsequent to the accident, Joshua Jones filed an insurance claim against Crosley's Safeway Insurance automobile policy. He claimed he was inside the 2014 Chevrolet Camaro when Crosley struck it in the parking lot of the McDonald's. Jones also claimed he had bodily injury as a result of the crash. Safeway Insurance documented the claim under number 1179606-LA. On June 1, 2023, Jones made a recorded oral statement to Safeway SIU regarding his alleged attendance at Massage Envy, according to the back pain he suffered from the crash with Brittney Crosley in the McDonalds parking lot. On June 19, 2023, Jones sent an itemized bill, alleged from Massage Envy for services rendered, to Safeway Insurance Company according to his claim against Crosley's automobile insurance policy. The LSP investigation determined the documents submitted by Jones were fraudulent and an application for an Order of Arrest for Joshua Jones for the crimes of R.S. 22:1925 Relative to Automobile Insurance Fraud and R.S. 14:72 relevant to Forgery. Order of Arrest was issued by the honorable Commissioner Andre Doguet. The potential fraud amount related to Jones's actions was \$2405.00. Jones has not been apprehended at this time. On Thursday, February 29, 2024, Jones surrendered himself and was booked into the Lafayette Parish Correctional Center.

Insurance Fraud-Auto Theft

(Iberia) - On December 6, 2023, the Louisiana Department of Insurance (LDI) forwarded a criminal referral LDI 912474 to the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit (LSP-IFAT). According to the referral, Allstate Insurance Company alleged that Skye L. Freyou committed Insurance Fraud (Automobile) on or about November 13, 2023 in Iberia Parish, Louisiana. On November 13, 2023, Freyou's 2021 Chrysler 300 was recovered crashed at 1104 E Highway 90 Frontage Road and LA 83, New Iberia, Louisiana. The Iberia Parish Sheriff's Office responded to the scene. They requested the assistance of the Louisiana State Police, who also responded. Freyou initially advised the Iberia Parish Sheriff's Office that his car was stolen. He then recanted his statement and told the Iberia Parish Sheriff's Office Deputy and the Louisiana State Trooper that a friend of his, "Dom", who sometimes uses the car, drove it to the store. Dom advised him he was using it to go to the store; as the vehicle wasn't stolen. After recovering the crashed 2021 Chrysler 300, Freyou filed an insurance claim under his Allstate Insurance automobile policy. He claimed an auto theft with his vehicle. Allstate Insurance documented the claim under number. The claim was filed on November 13, 2023, at 19:52 hours via the First Notice of Loss. On Friday, May 10, 2024, an application for an Order of Arrest for Skye Freyou

for the crime of Louisiana Revised Statute 22:1925, Automobile Insurance Policies Fraud. The Honorable Judge Anthony Saleme, of the 16th Judicial District Court, issued the warrant. On Monday, June 9, 2024, the Iberia Parish Sheriff's Office took Skye Freyou into custody on the LSP arrest warrant for one count of R.S. **Policies** 22:1925 Relative to Automobile Insurance Fraud. Freyou was booked into the Iberia Parish Correctional Center without incident. The potential fraud amount related to Freyou's actions was \$11,653.95.

Region 3 Investigative Highlights

Producer Fraud

(Caddo) - On August 3, 2022, the Louisiana Department of Insurance forwarded criminal referral LDI 866068 to the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit. According to the referral, RISCOM Claim Services LLC, alleged Todd L. Hadwin of Superior Risk Support Services LLC, committed Producer Insurance Fraud on or about June 26, 2021, in Caddo Parish, Louisiana. The criminal referral was forwarded to the Region 3 Bossier Field Office for review. RISCOM Claims Services alleged Todd Hadwin, an independent claims adjuster - Superior Risk Support, LLC, who was employed on RISCOM's behalf, committed fraud to receive additional funds for which he was not entitled. RISCOM confronted Hadwin, the evidence showed he collected funds he was not entitled to receive. Hadwin responded by sending RISCOM an email apologizing for his fraudulent activities, blaming his gambling addiction for his actions. RISCOM presented documents that showed Hadwin's alleged fraudulent business

practices including customers residing in Dubach, Ruston, Monroe, Caddo Parish, and Tyler, TX. Detectives were unable to substantiate all of these claims based on the information presented, out-of-state jurisdiction issues, and the lack of involved; cooperation of witnesses/victims however, detectives were able to verify RISCOM's claim involving one of their clients residing in Caddo Parish. For this claim, Hadwin received \$2,043.67 which he was not entitled to receive. Upon the conclusion of the investigation, it was determined that Hadwin violated Louisiana Revised Statue 22:1562 D. (2) Unfair Trade Practices (F). On February 7, 2024, upon the completion of the Louisiana State Police investigation, an arrest warrant for Hadwin was secured from the 1st Judicial District Court for violation of 22:1562 D. (2) Unfair Trade Practices. On February 14, 2024, Hadwin surrendered to Caddo Parish deputies at the Caddo Parish Jail where he was arrested, booked, and processed accordingly.

Auto Claims Fraud and Filing a False Affidavit

(Caddo) - On September 1, 2023, the Louisiana Department of Insurance forwarded criminal referral LDI 905206 to the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit. According to the referral, Progressive Insurance Company alleged Eddie M. Johnson committed Auto Insurance Fraud on or about August 14, 2023, in Caddo Parish, Louisiana. The investigation uncovered evidence showed Johnson that abandoned his 2011 BMW 750I at a local repair shop after being informed of the high cost of repairs (hybrid/battery, over \$5,000.00) needed. Johnson then contacted the Shreveport Police Department and filed a stolen vehicle report and later contacted Progressive and filed a

claim for payment. Upon the conclusion of the investigation, it was determined Eddie Marquis Johnson violated Louisiana Revised Statutes, 22:1924 Insurance Fraud and 14:67.26 Filing a False Affidavit. On February 9, 2024, upon the completion of the Louisiana State Police investigation, an arrest warrant for Johnson was secured from the 1st Judicial District Court for the aforementioned violations. On February 16, 2024, Johnson surrendered to Caddo Parish deputies at the Caddo Parish Jail, Shreveport on the aforementioned warrant where he was arrested, booked, and processed accordingly.

Automobile Insurance Fraud

(Rapides) - In March 2024, the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit received a criminal referral from the LA Department of Insurance (LDI). According to the referral, Southern Farm Bureau Casualty Insurance Company alleged that Alisa Kelley committed Insurance Fraud (Automobile) January 19, 2024 in Rapides Parish, Louisiana. On January 19, 2024, Alisa Kelley reported to the Alexandria Police Department that her 2014 Chevrolet Silverado had been stolen. On January 20, 2024, Pineville Police Department officers had recovered the vehicle and identified the driver as Chase Dauzat. The investigation discovered that Kelley sent Dauzat a pinned location of 5795 Goodland Trace, Alexandria, Louisiana and told Dauzat her vehicle had broken down. Kelley then requested Dauzat to dispose of the vehicle. Dauzat went to the location, recovered the keys from the gas cap, retrieved the vehicle, and drove it to his residence. According to Farm Bureau's claim notes, Kellev told Farm Bureau someone "hacked" her Facebook page and sent the messages. During a

LSP interview, Kelley claimed she left her phone in the truck at the time it was stolen and Dauzat used her phone to send the messages to himself. In May of 2024, following the conclusion of the LSP investigation, an arrest warrant was obtained for Alisa Kelley for violations of LRS 22:1925, Automobile Insurance Fraud and LRS 14:132, First Degree Injuring public records, when she falsely reported her vehicle stolen to the Alexandria Police Department. On June 18, 2024, Ball Police Department officers stopped Kelley for speeding in the 600 block of Paradise Road. An NCIC inquiry revealed the aforementioned warrant for Kelley. Kelley was read her Miranda rights and booked into Rapides Parish Detention Center without incident.

Bodily Injury Fraud

(Lincoln) - On November 4, 2022, the Louisiana Department of Insurance forwarded a criminal referral (LDI 874398) to the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit. According to the referral, Walmart alleged Bridgette Davis committed Bodily Insurance Fraud on or about August 5, 2022, in The referral was Lincoln Parish, Louisiana. forwarded to the Region 3 Monroe Field Office for review. On March 18, 2024, this case was assigned for criminal investigative review. During LSP-IFAT's investigation, it was Davis violated LRS determined Insurance Fraud, by providing false information to Walmart Claims Services in an attempt to receive compensation from a staged "slip and fall" at Walmart Supercenter, located at 1201 North Service Road in Ruston, Louisiana. Had Davis' scheme been successful, it would have cost Walmart Claims Services approximately \$8,700.00 for which they bore no legal obligation to pay. On June 11, 2024, an arrest warrant was issued by the 3rd Judicial District Court for Davis for violation of LRS 22:1924, General Insurance Fraud. On June 14, 2024, Davis surrendered herself to Lincoln Parish deputies at the Lincoln Parish Correctional Center on the state police arrest warrant where she was arrested, booked, and processed accordingly.

Law Enforcement Training

One of the major duties of the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit is to provide training to law enforcement around the state. This training is conducted at numerous P.O.S.T. academies and various law enforcement agencies. During these trainings, detectives emphasize the importance of performing thorough physical inspections of vehicles and explain the accurate way to complete the affidavit of physical inspection form. Additionally, detectives provide automobile theft training on the different types of auto theft being committed and the various ways conduct detailed investigations. Officers attending these trainings are able to gain the ability to better identify false claims of auto theft and confirm the identity of a motor vehicle by its vehicle identification number (VIN).

In 2024, members of the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit continued to broaden their knowledge of insurance and auto theft by attending various conferences and training events. A few of the conferences attended

by members were the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators Conference in New Orleans, Louisiana, in June 2024 (where members were asked to provide a presentation to attendees), the Coalition Against Insurance conference in Kansas City, MO (June 2024), and the 2024 International Association of SIUs conference in Nashville, TN (August 2024). The various training and educational events provided members LSP-IFAT with necessary information to assist in the collaborative efforts with industry stakeholders to effectively fight fraud while ensuring legal compliance.

Certifications

Per LRS 40:1422, within two years of their assignment to the unit, all members of the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit are required to obtain the certification of Fraud Claim Law Specialist (FCLS). The training and certification is provided by the American Educational Institute (AEI) and conducted by correspondence-type courses.

The FCLS designation is recognized throughout the industry as the mark of professional achievement. Members are able to receive training in various courses. Through the AEI's "Law of Claims and Investigation Fraud Defense Program", detectives receive coursework in the following six key areas: Recognizing Fraud, Special Investigation, Proving Fraud, Handling Suspicious Claims, Avoiding Bad Faith & Civil Handling Suspicious in Advanced Legal Issues in Fraud Investigation and Defense, and Auto Insurance Fraud.

Upon successfully completing the core courses,

detectives receive their FCLS designation and certification.

Vehicle Theft

Along with investigating insurance fraud cases, the Louisiana State Police Insurance Fraud / Auto Theft Unit (LSP-IFAT) actively works to investigate and prevent automobile thefts around the state. This is achieved through the unit's consistent utilization of the industries best practices and resources to apprehend criminals involved in auto theft.

Through collaborative efforts with the National

Insurance Crime Bureau (NICB), the Louisiana Department of Insurance, along with numerous law enforcement agencies, insurance companies, and other stakeholders, LSP-IFAT was able to take a proactive approach to addressing auto theft investigations by enhancing the ability to identify and recover stolen vehicles. One of these methods is through the use of a patrol vehicle outfitted with a grant funded ALPR or Automatic License Plate Reader. During 2024, unit personnel recovered 149 vehicles across the state, with a cumulative value of approximately \$3M.

With the assistance of its' partners, the Unit will continue to work to safeguard the public from the impact of auto thefts and provide information on the various methods of auto theft being conducted around the state.



INSURANCE FRAUD SUPPORT UNIT 2024 ANNUAL REPORT



Louisiana Attorney General Liz Murrill is proud of the efforts of her Insurance Fraud Support Unit (the Unit). Through criminal prosecutions and the recovery of restitution from insurance fraud offenders, the unit is a valuable asset in the fight against

criminals who defraud the State and its taxpayers. The Unit operates as part of a tri-agency task force created by the Legislature and dedicated solely to fighting insurance fraud in Louisiana.

The Unit fulfills three primary responsibilities: providing legal advice and consultation in insurance fraud matters to the other two task force agencies – the Louisiana State Police (LSP) and the Louisiana Department of Insurance (LADOI); prosecuting individuals statewide charged with insurance fraud; and presenting insurance fraud information and training to the insurance industry along with state and federal agencies.

The primary objective of the Unit is to provide superior legal representation to the LADOI and LSP in insurance fraud investigations and prosecutions. Assistant Attorneys General assigned to the Unit prosecute violations of Louisiana's criminal laws under Titles 14, 22, 23, and 47 by conducting – or assisting in – criminal prosecutions upon the recusal or assistance request of local district attorneys and by providing legal support to law enforcement agencies investigating criminal insurance fraud.

The Unit may handle insurance fraud cases that begin with a complaint made directly to the Attorney General's Office. Additionally, the Unit

may consult with – and provide legal support to – all local and state law enforcement agencies regarding insurance fraud matters and questions. This includes, but is not limited to, reviewing drafts of arrest and search warrants; conducting legal research; and evaluating cases from a prosecutor's perspective (i.e., whether there is sufficient evidence to satisfy legal burdens of proof). Due to the complex nature of some of the cases handled - the local district attorney may be consulted while the investigation is still ongoing to obtain the necessary authority to offer a plea agreement, immunity to a target of the investigation to secure his cooperation concerning other targets, or request to prosecute the case outright.

The Unit's attorneys attend regularly scheduled intelligence-sharing meetings hosted by LSP in Baton Rouge. These meetings are attended by members of special investigative units from many insurance companies that do business in Louisiana. Under a statutory grant of immunity from civil liability, these personnel share information with law enforcement regarding fraud trends and specific active investigations. This information sharing allows participants in the Louisiana Insurance Fraud Task Force to stay abreast of the constantly evolving methods that offenders employ to commit fraud, and has resulted in the successful prosecutions of several staged accident rings, producer fraud cases, health care provider fraud cases, and theft of equipment and automobiles.

All of the Unit's attorneys attend continuing legal education training from various sources, including the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC) and other NICB or NAIC sponsored training. Moreover, the Unit is

Security connected with the Homeland Information Network - enabling attorneys to track insurance fraud cases from start to finish. This network allows everyone involved with the cases to have access to relevant information at all times. Members from the AG's Office also serve on the board of the Louisiana Auto Theft and Prevention Insurance Fraud Authority (LATIFPA).

The Unit continues its work of protecting consumers and insurers in Louisiana by actively working with its partners in the State Insurance Fraud Task Force, and by fostering relationships with insurers to ensure that their interests in deterring and prosecuting fraud are fully represented in the criminal justice system.

BASIC INFORMATION ABOUT THE UNIT

Statutory Authority for Operations

La. Const. Art. IV, Section 8 provides, in pertinent part:

As necessary for the assertion or protection of any right or interest of the state, the attorney general shall have authority

- (2) upon the written request of a district attorney, to advise and assist in the prosecution of any criminal case; and
- (3) for cause, when authorized by the court which would have original jurisdiction and subject to judicial review, (a) to institute, prosecute, or intervene in any criminal action or proceedings, or (b) to supersede any attorney representing the state in any civil or criminal action.

La. Code of Criminal Procedure Article 682 provides, in pertinent part:

When a district attorney is recused...it shall be the duty of the Attorney General to appoint a member of his staff...to act in the place of the recused district attorney.

La. R. S. 36:702(E) provides:

There shall be within the Department of Justice a criminal division. It shall be responsible for criminal appeals, amicus curiae briefs in criminal prosecutions, habeas corpus defense, assistance to district attorneys in criminal cases, criminal prosecution, public corruption, institutional and insurance fraud cases, and extraditions, in accordance with Article IV, Section 8 of the Constitution of Louisiana.

STATISTICAL INFORMATION FOR THE UNIT

A strategic objective for the Unit is to provide legal support to law enforcement agencies investigating criminal insurance fraud referrals by responding to requests for legal consultation within two working days and by attending 90% of intelligence-sharing meetings hosted by the LSP Insurance Fraud Unit. In 2024, the Unit's attorneys attended all six of the intelligence sharing meetings with the LADOI and the LSP fraud units.

During the 2024 calendar year, the Unit not only reached the standard of 95% percent of requests for legal consultation responded to

within 2 working days; but exceeded this goal by handling 100% of all requests for legal consultation within two working days.

The Unit meets the State goal for Crime and Safety Reform of bringing security to all Louisiana citizens by protecting our taxpayers from insurance related fraud. LADOI estimates that there are over \$500 million dollars lost annually in Louisiana to insurance fraud, as it as it pertains to casualty and property claims. This does not include healthcare fraud which is estimated to be about \$1.5 billion in Louisiana alone. The typical Louisiana household pays almost \$1,000 a year in fraud-related charges passed on to them as consumers.

OTHER 2024 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During the 2018 calendar year, the Unit entered into a prosecution assistance agreement with the 19th Judicial District Attorney's Office – allowing Assistant Attorneys General to prosecute all insurance fraud cases occurring in East Baton Rouge Parish (or where East Baton Rouge Parish is a proper jurisdiction). This agreement has resulted in 32 active pending prosecutions of Task Force cases as of December 31, 2022. Nine different Assistant Attorneys General are currently prosecuting Task Force cases in various jurisdictions throughout the State of Louisiana, allowing the development of experience and expertise in insurance fraud cases on a broader level in the Criminal Division of the Attorney General's Office.

In 2024, the Unit instituted 42 new prosecutions of Insurance Fraud Task Force cases. The Unit also resolved twenty-two Task Force cases by way of felony guilty pleas in 2024. Included in that number are ten convictions of defendants apprehended in "Operation Dirty Deeds" conducted by the Louisiana State Police. These defendants were

participants in an organized group engaged in Filing False Public Records, Forgery and Tax Evasion seeking to defraud the State of Louisiana.

The Unit continues to strive to increase its role in active prosecution of Task Force cases statewide to ensure that taxpayers and insurers in Louisiana are protected from fraud. In their role as prosecutors, Assistant Attorneys General work to see justice done in each individual case, and to highlight the important work done by its partners in combatting insurance fraud.

Claims Fraud...

Commissioner Tim Temple's Office of Insurance Fraud (OIF) received 3,715 reports of suspected fraudulent claims during 2024. The majority were from insurance companies in accordance with La. R.S. 22:1926. Since its inception in 2007, the Office of Insurance Fraud database has accumulated 52,318 entries of suspected fraudulent claims.

During 2024, the Office of Insurance Fraud referred 2,900 claim fraud investigations to Louisiana State Police. There were 83 arrests resulting in 150 charges for numerous crimes as a result of criminal referrals related to suspected fraudulent insurance claims.

The Office of Insurance Fraud reorganized in 2024 to encompass insurance fraud investigations for any person who is suspected to have committed a fraudulent insurance act –regardless of whether the subject of the investigation is licensed by the Louisiana Department of Insurance (LDI). The LDI's OIF, in partnership with other Anti-Fraud Trask Force members, deployed market surveillance to monitor online behavior within the context of the insurance ecosystem, is deploying measures to identify and investigate collusive insurance fraud, and is developing artificial intelligence initiatives to aid in efficient use of human resources.
